
EDUCATIONAL ASSIGNMENT for JOSEPH JOHN WUNDERLICH for his 3rd trimester of 10th grade





This is a church that was on a point of an island used as a customs checkpoint for big ships coming in. It was built by the Venetians. The first picture above is me standing near Piazza san Marco, looking over the grand canal. In easier to remember terms, Venice is shaped like a fish and this building is on the underside of the fish. The Piazza san Marco was the center of the Venetian government and is now a public square and gathering spot. Music is played frequently in small bands at night and dusk, the town seems most lively at night as well.

The man in the second picture is an artist I met while walking down a back street in Venice. He drew for us a fast charcoal sketch of what looks like the building I saw in the first picture, though it could have been the Piazza san Marco, both buildings have several domes near one another.
