If you have been approved to continue your work from 499A or another course, state the specifics. Put a copy of this Proposal Statement in your Journal.

(Due 3/9) JOURNAL Check #1 (20% of Course Grade)

- All weekly activities documented, plus class notes from lectures and discussions
- PROJECT Preliminary Sketches & Narrative

Hand-drawn sketches of your design

Hand-drawn sketches of an alternative design (for comparison)

At least 100 words (hand written in block lettering) of what is inspiring your design

(Due 4/20) PROJECT Final Defense (30% of Course Grade)

You may also be asked to present on 4/19 Scholarship & Creative Arts Day

(Due 4/27) JOURNAL Check #2 (10% of Course Grade)

All weekly activities documented, plus class notes from lectures and discussions (since Journal Check #1)

(Due 5/8) ELECTRONIC ARCHITECTURE-PORTFOLIO (25% of Course Grade)

Have your professional electronic portfolio updated with highlights of your semester work. Email to Dr Wunderlich and Dr Ricci a link to your portfolio. Include as many sketches and drawings as possible from the semester. Also include narrative of noteworthy architectural details and specifications
