# **Architectural Design Theory**

Basic vocabulary of architectural design. Fundamental elements of space and form. Space in relation to light, view, openings, and enclosures. The organization of space, and the elements and relationships of circulation, as well as proportion and scale. Fundamental elements of architecture through the ages and across cultures. Case studies begin with vernacular contexts followed by changes in forms driven by cultural and esthetic preferences over time. Influences of new materials and architectural standards and practices, with emphasis on sustainability and organic architecture. *Course Credit: 3, Prerequisites: none*
