ART/SOC 371 Frank Lloyd Wright

2nd Summer Term 2020

Frank Lloyd Wright was indisputably the greatest American architect of all time, and is arguably the greatest architect of all time. His life spanned 91 years from 1867 to 1958 with more than 70 productive years in architecture, producing over 1000 designs, of which over 500 where built -- most of which have been preserved. His life is also the subject of both social and historical significance; Born two years after the end of the Civil War and in the middle of the second American Industrial Revolution, his life spanned two World Wars, the Roaring 20s, the Great Depression, and into the Cold War. Both his architectural genius, and the drama of his life, effected/affected many people around him in both his professional and personal life. He has been a subject of interest to many people from the late 1800s until present time. This interdisciplinary course will focus on both the architectural significance of his work as well as the social impacts of his life, and will require students to create inspired architectural works. *Course Credit: 3, Prerequisites: none*
